Boston, MA (October 31, 2022) – Claudia Fiks and the Arts Administration Association New England are pleased to present *Speak Up* 2022 – the second iteration of an exhibition calling on artists to use their powerful voices to promote changes and awareness.

The exhibition's first iteration took place in 2020, spurred by the urgent need felt viscerally throughout the art community and beyond to speak up about issues of social and racial injustice brought to the foreground by the pandemic, the election, and the historic activist movements sweeping the country. This year's call continues that conversation by asking artists from New York and New England to use their craft to create a platform for discourse about the issues that persist and those that have emerged as the most pressing of our time.

The 50 pieces included in this exhibition were selected by jurors Antonio Viva, Executive Director of Artisan's Asylum, and Petra Slinkard, Director of Curatorial Affairs at Peabody Essex Museum, and focus on diverse issues through a broad array of materials and skillful techniques. Many works center on human rights, health care, oppression, and hope. There is a strong showing of artists addressing the climate crisis, often through upcycled artworks repurposing discarded materials. Other topics in the show include war, gun control, artivism, and racial injustice. The exhibition presents an opportunity to reflect on the hard-learned lessons of our recent past and to imagine the just and equitable future we are called to create together.
